
POINTS TO PONDER:

Are you easily distracted? I seem to be easily distracted lately. Have you considered that even simple distractions may be part of a spiritual battle? Peter gives this warning --

• Be sober and self-controlled. Be watchful. Your adversary, the devil, walks around like a roaring lion, seeking whom he may devour. (1 Peter 5:8)

The devil is our "adversary", and while Peter here characterizes the devil as a roaring lion, that is not always the way he approaches us. Lions are good at stalking quietly as well. Paul warns us of schemes of the devil (Other translations say "wiles of the devil" – bringing to mind a sneaky coyote).



- Put on the whole armor of God, that you may be able to stand against the *schemes of the devil*. (Ephesians 6:11) Paul also indicates that God provides leaders for a unity in the Body of Christ ...
- so that we may no longer be children, tossed to and fro by the waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by human cunning, by *craftiness in deceitful schemes*. (Ephesians 4:14)

In this same verse, Paul indicates the devil uses human cunning to execute his schemes.

One subtle tool of deceit is the planting, or promotion of, the accusation that the Bible disagrees with itself, therefore it discredits itself and a belief in Christ. Rather than ponder why folks are surprised that eye-witnesses seldom tell an identical story of an event, let us take a simple example I encountered this week while looking at the Transfiguration story.

- Matthew 6:1 And after <u>six days</u> Jesus took with him Peter and James, and John his brother, and led them up a high mountain by themselves.
- Mark 9:2 And after <u>six days</u> Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain by themselves.
- Luke 9:28 Now about <u>eight days</u> after these sayings he took with him Peter and John and James and went up on the mountain to pray.

So, which was it, six or eight days? I believe the answer is "YES", to both.

First, there is the whole confusion about the Hebrew perspective of a "day" starting at sundown, our modern perspective about the day beginning when we get up and see the sunlight, and the 24 hour clock day starting at midnight --- and we are just not going to bother with all of that. Why? Because it is much simpler than that. We have a time between two events, and that is what is Biblically important. So consider the time between Christmas and New Year's Day ---

- Early Christmas day, I look forward to New Year's Day and think: Today, the 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, 31st, and the 1st; ABOUT EIGHT DAYS from now I will be enjoying a new year.
- You may look at the calendar on Christmas and think: 26th, 27th, 28th, 29th, 30th, and 31st; ONLY 6 MORE DAYS UNTIL New Year's.

The Bible verses are written by different people at different times with a variation in the original audience. Therefore, personal cultural preference is involved. However, never forget the words penned were God Breathed (influenced by the Holy Spirit).

John does not mention this Transfiguration event directly, but John's Gospel timeline provides an important clue about these events. Read John 6:66-71 and 7:1-39. Examining these verses, and the verses in Matthew, Mark and Luke that precede the Transfiguration, the timeline is after Peter's declaration that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the Living God, and the Transfiguration vision. In that timeline, per John, is the "Feast of Tabernacles" (or Booths, or Tents, or simply Sukkot). This festival focuses on Moses, the Law and Exodus story. It is one of three festivals people were expected to travel to the Temple to celebrate. Today, with no temple, Jews still cerebrate by building a three sided, mostly open "booth" or "tent" outside to stay in for the celebration. Sukkot follows shortly after the Day

of Atonement, or Yom Kippur. Sukkot is an 8 day festival with a high holy day at the beginning and at the end, so 6-24-hour days in between what is essentially two Sabbath days.

So, now some thoughts to ponder:

- The Gospel authors know this happened during Sukkot. Tying the span of this festival with 6 ordinary feast days recalls the tie between this holy festival and Moses' receiving of the law on Sinai (see Exodus 24:16) where clouds cloaked the mountain (similar to the Transfiguration) for 6 days: A way of indicating, to Jews, that the Transfiguration is at the end of Sukkot. Non-Jewish converts to Christ may know of this 8 day festival, but not the significance of 6 days between two high holy days. Also, the number 8 indicates a "new beginning". Six or eight may simply be a "know your audience" kind of thing: invoke a memory of Sinai, or signal a new beginning because the Law has been fulfilled.
- Peter's confession of faith was a few days before Sukkot, and maybe the authors were hinting that it was on the Day of Atonement that Peter declared Jesus was God. Historically on this day, and this day only, the High Priest pronounces the true name of God (YHWH) in the Holy of Holies. Stating this parallel, overtly, at the time would probably prompt "righteous" Jews to stone you, but Jewish believers in Jesus would probably understand the parallel.
- Moses and Elijah are both present at the Transfiguration, representing the Law and Prophets (Jesus fulfilled all the Law and Prophecies).
- John has Jesus present at the Temple on the last day of the feast (John 7-37-39) declaring Himself to be "living water": This was, most likely, at the Sukkot morning "Water pouring ceremony" in the Temple a ritual symbolic of the outpouring of God's Spirit. For the Jews, another reason to kill Jesus for blasphemy.
- Festival of Booths just ending, and Peter wants to build booths for Jesus, Elijah, and Moses. It has been a hectic time for Peter: His world has been turned upside down. Peter now knows, and recently declared Jesus to be the Christ. Yet, Peter did not want Jesus to go to that cross. The prophet Zechariah had written that when the Messiah reigns on the earth, He will require all nations to come and celebrate the Feast of Booths (Zech. 14:16-19). Is that what Peter requested of Jesus on the mountain? Effectively, "Bring YOUR kingdom NOW, bypass that Cross."

Many things are useful in the story than a distracting debate over 6 or 8 days. For example, Peter's story is a reflection of us: Profound revelations leave us confused, and changing our responses based on a new understanding is difficult. Hearing God speak can be terrifying. It is our nature to want to stay on that mountain and camp out with God & the blessed of God, rather than descend to the valley of the unknown that may lead to a cross. Sometimes we forget that "we are made in God's image" means, when we appreciate an ironic situation or story, we are reflecting a nature of God. Search for these natures in Bible narratives. These apostles and early believers, like us, have an appreciation for a good story, including things like sarcasm, irony, and puns. The human elements embedded in the narratives are part of God's insight for us: seeking empathy for Peter's confused response may just keep me from doing something stupid.

So ... finally ---

Ponder this concerning this Transfiguration vision:

Moses died and was buried. Elijah was taken up to heaven and there is no grave for him on this earth. Jesus, the Lord who returns to judge the living and the dead, left an empty tomb and ascended into heaven. God's sense of irony????

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How to Grow Your Church

In my role as Director of Mission Growth, a common question that church members and even some pastors ask me is "How do we grow our church?" I love this question because it tells me a few things about the person asking it. First, the very question itself communicates that the person asking recognizes that their church has a purpose to connect to more people and reveals a "holy discontent" with the present reality. Secondly, the question also informs me that the asker is genuinely interested and open to learning and implementing new ideas. Both having a heart to connect with more people and a teachable spirit are key components to ministry success and congregational revitalization.

The question also presents a bit of a challenge: Growing a bigger church should never be the mission of the church! Instead, church growth is a biproduct of a church engaging in and accomplishing its true mission and purpose. So, what is the true mission and purpose of the church? In my opinion, it can be summed up with "connecting people to Jesus." Exactly what this looks like in each congregation and community can and should be very different: no two congregations are alike; nor are the contexts in which those congregations minister.

I truly believe that churches who prioritize connecting people to a life-giving relationship with Jesus will indeed grow. Yet growth, in and of itself, should not be the actual goal. What would happen if we stopped obsessing over worship attendance or confirmation class size or Sunday School participation and started prioritizing and praying for those in our community whom God is calling us to befriend with the purpose and intent of gently and lovingly connecting them with Jesus? How can churches prioritize this activity as their mission, encouraging and equipping one another for everyday mission work?

In the book 7 Habits of Healthy Churches, Marcus Carlson notes that "Healthy churches are focused more on those outside the church than those inside the church." I couldn't agree more with Carlson's assertion. To be clear, this does not mean that healthy churches do not care for one another within the church; healthy churches always love one another. What the author is pointing out is a reality I routinely observe: in the absence of a clear, outward-focused mission, congregations always default to pleasing their own members as their de facto purpose. Whenever a congregation focuses on member satisfaction, it becomes unhealthy and ultimately, inevitably declines.

God is calling the church to more. That more isn't simply to worry about stopping decline and growing our congregation. The more God is calling the church to is a mission that extends beyond our church walls and prioritizes connecting people to Jesus.
